

THROUGHOUT THE LIFE CYCLE

CHOOSE MORC-

AGES 0—13 _____

- County, Hospital, pediatrician, school, social worker, therapist, etc. links a child diagnosed with an intellectual disability to MORC, Inc. for service planning.
- MORC, Inc. completes an intake for Community Mental Health Services and helps family develop an Individual Plan of Service (IPOS) using person-centered planning.
- MORC, Inc. links family to medical, educational, mental health, and state resources and services as eligible.
- Begin working on activities of daily living, skill-building, and communication to increase independence.

Other Things to Consider:

- Contact Early On to enroll child in special education program.
- Review qualifications for Family Support Subsidy.
- Screen for Applied Behavior Analysis benefit waiver (up to 21 years of age and child must have Medicaid or MiChild for this service).
- Review with MORC, Inc. staff criteria for completing a Children's Waiver pre-screen up to 18.
- Review respite options.

AGE 14 _____

 Begin developing a Transitional Life Plan (TLP) with schools. (Should include Employability skills training, community education opportunities, housing, future funding needs and possible participation in driver's education.)

*Involve Michigan Department of Career Development in this process at least one year prior to graduation/post-secondary completion.

AGE 17----

- Plan educational program completion; diploma or a certificate of attendance track.
- Begin learning and making decisions about guardianship, alternatives to guardianship, special needs or irrevocable trusts, durable power of attorney, etc.
- If pursuing guardianship, pursue physical, psychological and a functional assessment (available for \$300 - \$1,000) and submit application for guardianship.
- For individuals interested in employment, explore potential skills building, vocational or internships programs available in your district.
- Begin thinking about future living options.

AGE 18 _____

The focus now shifts to more adult oriented concerns, i.e. housing, employment, money management, skill building, supports for health and safety and linking to social involvement in the community.

- During month of 18th birthday, contact relevant county access center for eligibility determination if not already enrolled in MORC Services
- MORC, Inc. completes an intake for Community Mental Health Services.
- MORC, Inc. helps family develop an Individual Plan of Service (IPOS) using person-centered planning.

Other Things to Consider

- Register to Vote
- Obtain State ID Card
- Register for Selective Services
- Apply for entitlements, i.e. Social Security Income, Medicaid, Bridge Card.
- Upon receipt of Medicaid, apply for Adult Home Help (AHH)
- Explore available residential options
- Review respite options.

AGING OUT OF SCHOOL (AGES 19 TO 26)

- Explore and determine best housing option which can include living with natural family, shared living, independent living, group home or other options.
- Begin futures planning for day activity programming
- Vocational options (supported employment, microenterprise, pre-vocational skill building)
- Community Living Supports
- Volunteering
- Day programs & hobbies
